Acknowledgements

This work wouldn't have been possible without the help and inspiration from many problemists. My acknowledgements shall go first to Thierry Le Gleuher, who made an impressive work of research and correction when the project started in march 2007. Dmitrij Baibikov joined a bit later with some informations still missing and many new records of his own.

Fellow retroanalists Nikolai Beluhov, Andrew Buchanan, Michael Grushko, Henrik Juel, Mario Richter, Bernd Schwarzkopf kindly provided missing informations, corrections and/or new records.

The idea of the compilation came from the work of Mario Richter and Werner Keym, who compiled the economy records in "last single move" problems. The problems are available in the excellent website of Otto Janko, who also set up the retro mailing list, which is an invaluable link with other retroanalists.

Gerd Wilts has made another website of interest, which contains thousands of chess problems and was used as a reference for a lot of material in this booklet.

Andrew Buchanan, the inventor of Dead Reckoning, proposed to put the problems in a nice dynamical presentation on his website. Be sure to pay him a visit, he has collected many subjects of interest to retroanalists.

Last, but not least, i owe a special debt to Yves Tallec who was very patient and tried to explain me what a chess problem is.

Introduction

This small booklet is about retrograde analysis in chess. This is a kind of problem where the solver has to find the recent past of the game in order to answer the question. A very simple retrograde analysis problem is **C3b** where the last single move is a promotion to bishop.

A single move is, as you may have guessed, a move made by one player only. For example 1.f3 e5 2.Kf2 Qh4+ 3.Ke3 Qd4# contains 6 single moves (it's also the only game finishing by 3... Qd4# and was found by François Labelle). We say that a single move is completely determined if we know exactly what piece has moved (or pieces in the case of castling), where to, where from, and also which enemy unit was captured if such is the case. So we must know exactly how the board was before every single move.

We will interest in problems where we can find out as many previous single move as possible. All problems in the booklets are length records (as known to us) for a given number of pieces, ie no known position with less pieces allows to find as much previous single moves. If two positions share the same number of pieces and the same length, the preference goes to the one minimizing the number of officers (Q, R, B, N), then to the one minimizing the number of heavy officers (Q, R), then to the one minimizing the number of queens. If both positions are still similar, the one published first (or received first in my mailbox) will have the preference. Anyway, if space allows it, i will try to publish ex-aequo. That's why you can see **B4b** composed 2 months after **B4a** and also **B4c** which has one officer more.

The problems are classified in 6 different types, as shown in page 1. Type A, B and C are almost standard in retro analysis, but type C was modified so as to have a complete separation between types (a partition), which was not the case with the previous definition: "One king **may** be in check."

In the duplex type there's one solution assuming White has played last and another one assuming Black has played last. If the first move of both solutions is similar it's called a type DD problem. In case both lengths differ, the overall length will be set to the lower value.

Type E and F were not classified before, but again we have a partition based on the presence or absence of an uncolored piece attacking both kings (this may prove tricky with pawns). In Rex Multiplex n°27, Andrey Frolokin mentioned that **E15a**, **E15b**, **F4a**, **F4c** and **F5** were of type C (historical definition?).

The choice of possible last moves is larger in type A problems than in type D or B, and in type D or B than in type C. That's why type A problems are usually preferred. In the same way type E problems are preferred to type F problems.

The table on page 3 shows a summary of the known length records up to now. The number in the first column is the total number of pieces on the board. Then there is one column per problem type. For a given number of pieces and a given problem type, the corresponding cell will contain a length only if a problem with that number of pieces improves the preceding record for this type.

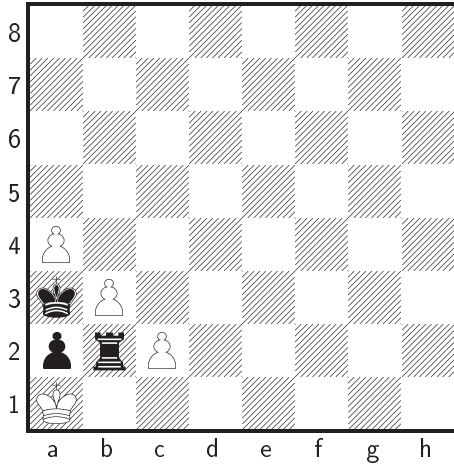
One shall note it's easy to create a type B problem out of every type A or type D problems without changes in the number of pieces, that's why you may have an A or D letter in the B column instead of a number of moves. It's also possible to create a type B problem out of a type C problem by retracting the last checking move (unless it's an en passant capture or a castling), but it may change the number of moves or the number of pieces, so this time the modified problem is repeated.

The informations concerning a problem, such as date of publication, name of magazine, etc. are given alongside the solution of the problem. Also when a problem derives from another one i tried to give the original problem in FEN notation with full credits.

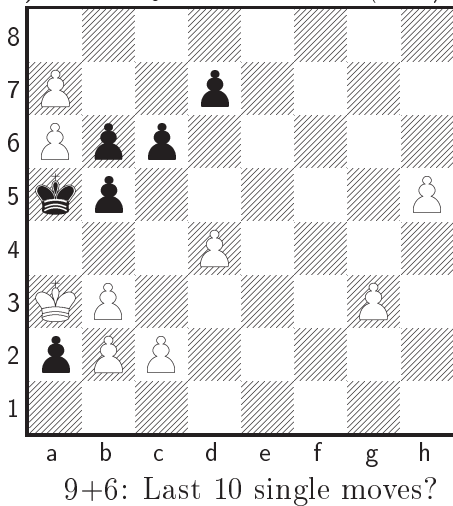
Older problems
